The Friends Celebrate
20th Anniversary of
the Acton Arboretum

Tours, Demonstrations and Exhibits acquainted visitors with what the Arboretum has to offer

The Friends of the Acton Arboretum sponsored Discover the Acton Arboretum Day on Sunday, May 21 from 10-4 pm. Under a festive tent, exhibits abounded: Invasive Plants by member and Land Steward Committee Chairman Jim Snyder-Grant with materials supplied by the New England Wildflower Society, Acton Bluebird Recovery by member Nan Towle Millet, Bird Workshop by Girl Scout Sarah Minkoff to earn her Silver Award, and the Friends of the Acton Arboretum Information table with photos and tour guides of Arboretum points of interest. Visitors enjoyed tours of the Arboretum: Acton Historical Society member and Friends Board member Belle Choate explored clues of the property's past on a tour that examined trees, paths, rocks, and water features; Jim Snyder-Grant led a tour to point out examples of invasive plants; Tom Tidman and Boot Boutwell each discussed wildlife and shrub identification on their tour. Cathy Hatfield introduced plans for the CPA project recently approved to construct handicapped accessible trail to the new lilac collection and fragrance garden. Judy Dembsey, Sue Whitcomb, Joan Yatteau and Bruce Carley were on hand to share their knowledge of the Hosta Garden, Herb Garden, Butterfly Garden and Wildflower Gardens, as caretakers of these Arboretum features. Ken Mayer, Commercial Sales Manager for Weston Nurseries and Friends Board member, demonstrated planting and pruning shrubs, including a Harry Lauder's Walking Stick and a lilac. A cake ceremony was a highlight at midday, when we showed our appreciation of Tom Tidman, Town of Acton Natural Resources Director, who has been an instrumental force in the evolution of the Acton Arboretum since 1987.


Town Receives CPA Grant for Universal Trail

It opens a large part of the Arboretum to an underserved population: visitors with wheelchairs, canes and walkers and the legally blind.

A \$24,000 proposal by the Town of sents 850 feet of new handicapped Acton to build a Universal Access trail to the Lilac and Fragrance collection was approved by the Community Preservation Committee and continues along the Orchard Loop Town Meeting this spring. This proposal was supported by the Friends of the Acton Arboretum, and Cathy Hatfield is to be commended for her many hours of project leadership. This out-and-back trail passes the existing Swale, Butterfly and Herb Gardens. As pictured below, the blue line repre-

accessible trail that will begin where the green trails from the Herb Garden and Butterfly Garden merge. It and makes a left onto the Wildflower side-to-side and running slope is Loop, toward the Farm Pond. It turns back toward a clearing that has been made to accommodate the Lilac Collection and future Fragrance Garden. A black walnut tree is centered where the trail loops back to features of the handicapped accessi-

ble trail will include: a 5' width; the surface will be smooth, firm and compacted with no protrusions and with color and texture change between the trail and trail edge; the within guidelines of 2% and 5%, respectively; any running slope greater than 5% will be stabilized; resting areas will be spaced about every 200 feet; resting benches with backs and arms to be donated by the return to the Wildflower Loop. The Friends will have a 3' x 5' stable surface next to the bench.

It was well attended. Three pine trees in declining health were removed this winter from the Hosta Garden. Replacement trees have been selected and will be planted, with generous funding from Cyndy Guy, in memory of her brother Jim, an Acton Arboretum fan and Concord resident. The trees include a Sophora japonica 'Regent' (Japanese Scholar tree), a Ginko biloba 'Autumn Gold' (Ginko), and a Syringa

reticulata 'Ivory Silk' (Japanese tree lilac). Thirty members of the ABRHS graduating class of 2006 joined our volunteers in mulching the Hosta, Butterfly, Nursery, Lilac and Rhododendron collections, and raking paths on Friday, April 28th.
